Happy New Year! I'm looking forward to a year full of great outdoor adventures, and very excited to kick off 2022 by re-launching our Activity Challenge. On January 1, 2020, we initiated **the Centennial Activity**

Challenge, but we had to table that after a few weeks due to world-wide circumstances beyond our control. Starting January 1, 2022, we will re-launch that activity challenge, changing up the theme and logo a little bit as we surge into our second 100! So grab that centennial journal, or notebook, or calendar, or whatever you were using to track your activity participation, and let's start counting again.

We'll stick with the original Centennial parameters: the first 100 club members to participate in 100 posted club activities will receive a WMC "Activity Challenge" jacket (BTW, sending a huge shout out to Jim Dudley with Ouray Sportwear, who has been patiently hanging in there with us until we got this rolling challenge again). Here are a few rules:



- Starting January 1, 2022, start recording any activity you participate in that is posted on the WMC calendar.

 calendar (which means the activity is an approved WMC activity), it counts. Now that being said,

- If it's a multi-day activity, each day the activity is posted on the club calendar can be counted as a separate activity. You'll be doing something fun and different every day, right? If the travel day is included in the post, that counts too. It's an important "activity" of sharing resources, planning, and camaraderie.
- All 100 activities do NOT have to be completed this year. History shows that we're going to be around a while. The Challenge will continue until we get 100 members completing 100 activities.
- Yes, those activities that enthusiastic clubbers recorded from January 1, 2020, through March 22, 2020, count towards the challenge. Some were already well on their way, and all that dedication will roll over into this new effort.
- Once you record 100 activities (or 100 days of activities, if you participate in multi-day events), submit your documentation to the board. You will be highlighted in the Rambler, and you will get your prize at the next membership meeting.
- The more club activities you participate in, the sooner you reach the goal. If you don't see an activity that suits you, jump in an organize or co-organize!

Ah yes, Organizers : There are many things that distinguish the WMC from all other outdoor recreation groups. At the top of that list of distinguishers would be our Activity Organizers. Each year the club holds an appreciation banquet to show our support and appreciation for our organizers and other volunteers. In 2022, as we come together to rebuild our post-pandemic activity calendar, we're going to kick that up a notch or two with an Activity Organizers Raffle. Activity Organizers will get a raffle entry for every activity they organize (or each day of a multi-day activity), up to a maximum of 10 entries. The more you organize, the more chances you get to win a prize!

TRAVEL IN NIGERIA!!

Extracts from a letter from June and Bill Viavant dated 11 Nov. 1971 from Kano, Nigeria

Bill planned an ambitious but neat trip by car, driving through Africa and north to south (Algeria to South Africa), then across the ocean to Argentina, and driving South America from south to north and home to Salt Lake City. ...

However, when Bill planned our neat trip, he failed to take into account the incredible perversities of our Travelall, which visited garages in Dayton, Ohio, Brussels, Belgium, Ljubljana, Yugoslavia, Milano, Italy, Ghardaia, Algeria, Tadjemout, Algeria (where Bill and Dell were the mechanics), Tamanrasset, Algeria, and finally quit altogether (of a broken pinion gear and a broken motor mount) right in the middle of the Sahara.

June and the boys camped there for three days, while Bill hitched a ride to Agades. (The only vehicle going south in three days passed us 20 minutes after the breakdown.) There he arranged for a ten-ton truck to come out into the desert to get both us and our car (for a monstrous fee). The truck driver took us almost 1,000 miles to pavement, but refused to let us go until our check cleared the bank and returned. NOW we realize how VERY different Africa is. Eight, nine, ten days after the check left by air mail we were still waiting; we phoned the consul in the capital of Niger for advice or help, then waited another week; we wrote our bank directly ourselves airmail, then moved from the hotel into a vacant house that had been rented on a year's lease by AID and then had its program curtailed; we waited another week; then another whole week. Although the Nigerian border was only 100 miles away, there is no phone connection from one country to another (in fact, one must phone from Zinder, Niger to Paris, France, from Paris to London, and thence from London to Nigeria) so Bill made a quick trip across the border to try to locate parts. Although Travelalls are sold in Nigeria, there were no replacement rear assemblies there. Finally in desperation we simply went by bus and left the confounded car right there.

Our trip plans are in shambles...

[International Harvester stopped producing the Travelall in 1975, according to Wikipedia (photo right). It was a big station wagon / SUV that competed with the Chevy Suburban. Some models were 4WD. Some later model V8s got 8 mpg and had 55-gallon gas tanks; the 1973 oil crisis hurt sales badly. -Donn]

The Wasatch Mountain Club Historians

Did you ever wonder where the WMC history comes from?

I believe the founding members of the Wasatch Mountain Club (WMC) had a strong belief in the preservation of Club history. The WMC kept and saved records of meeting minutes starting in May of 1921 as found in the U. of U. Special Collections Box 3 Folder 1. In 1920 when the Club was first formally organized, there was not a Special Collections Library to store this information, so it was kept in house (and literally in houses). It was early on that the WMC decided it needed a Club Historian to save these documents.

It is important to note that every individual who writes about, or keeps and saves information about the WMC is in essence a historian. It is the obligation of the WMC President and Board of Directors to appoint a Club Historian to properly archive this material. The publication of the Ramblers has been the most important factor in preserving the history of the WMC. Also, during the 1920s and 1930s there were many excellent photographers recording Club history. Many of these photos were kept in large photo albums which were donated to the WMC Special Collections Library in 2019.

The first Yearly Rambler, Vol. I No. 4, 1923 states on page four "It is our purpose in this pamphlet to give our members a record of our past". On page thirteen it lists Mary Pack as Historian, and on page seventeen it states that the Committee on Advertising and Publicity would "Also act as historian." The 1924-25 Rambler: pages 81 and 82. Committee on Club History: Chairman Dr. L. D. Pfouts, Payson, Utah. [Dr. L. D. Pfouts was also a WMC photographer]. It shall be the duty of the chairman of this committee to act as historian. The historian must keep: A written record of each trip. with some pictures whenever possible. The record must, contain the following data: Name of trip, Date of trip, Number of miles by transportation (approximate), Method of transportation, Number of miles hiked (approximate), Number of members on trip, Number of non-members on trip, Charge to members, Charge to non-members, Weather conditions, Number reaching destination, Advisability of returning, Injuries incurred on trip, Number of meals furnished by club, and Remarks."

More evidence about the WMC Photo albums can be found in the 1939 July Rambler: "The Club's photograph album made its premier appearance at the Spring opening of the Lodge. It's beautifully done, thanks to John Christensen, and will be of great interest in years to come: but—its value depends on your assistance by letting Johnny make copies of your best club pictures for inclusion in it."

It's not clear if the Club had an assigned "Historian" again until 1946. In the WMC minutes from 1946 (Box 14 folder #6 Special Collection, U of U.) January 9 "Suggested that the Club have a Historian". February 6, "Loretta Bartlett is glad to have the position as Club Historian." There has been no Rambler located for 1949 and the 1950 Ramblers do not mention a Club historian. From the 1946 Rambler by Loretta Bartlett: "Wanted, too, though in a different connection are pictures (labeled as to name and date of trip), written accounts of interesting anecdotes or reports of trips the Club has taken, and any printed matter the Club has ever issued, such as schedule cards, yearbooks, and mimeographed papers. These are earnestly asked for-in order that a complete history of the Club may be chronicled. It matters not how long ago or how recently the episode may have occurred. The Club has been an important factor in exploring the lesser known parts of this and surrounding States, and too much emphasis cannot be placed on the importance of making and continuing a written record of its activities. This is a huge undertaking, but it is felt, a worthy one, and every Club member-present and past-is sincerely urged to help with it.



All anecdotes, information, and pictures should be sent to the Club's Historian." Loretta Bartlett's collection of WMC history was donated to the University of Utah Special Collections on January 2, 1985.

Dale Green is recognized by the WMC as a Club Hero and Legend for his dedication to the Club. Dale had a great interest in the preservation of the history of the WMC both past and present. We can read in the April, 1963 Rambler by Dale Green. "A new constitution change, the last change expected for some time, will be voted on at the Election meeting. This is to amend section 18 which now reads: "The Board of Trustees shall compile both written and pictorial history and shall present them to each annual meeting." The proposed amendment reads: "The Board of Directors shall appoint a Club Historian to compile and maintain said history." The change is proposed because the Board of Trustees has never compiled a history. We believe an appointed historian could at least keep a scrapbook of newspaper clippings."

Later that year in the August, 1963 Rambler Dale Green writes. "RAMBLINGS by Dale Green, President. The Board of Directors has appointed me as temporary CLUB HISTORIAN. My hope is that I will find someone who has the time and interest to take over on a permanent basis. My first job will be to collect old Ramblers and trip announcements. These copies will be collected if possible. The most complete set will be bound and placed in the Utah Room of the U. of U. Library. This copy may not be removed from the Reading-Room. The other two will go to the S.L. Public Library and the Club Historian. If you are willing to donate your old Ramblers, please call me at CR 7-6417. Donated Ramblers will be marked with the donor's name. I have some extra copies that I will swap if you desire. I am also interested in photos of Club events and people especially if identified by names and dates."

As the preservation of Our history continues, we see from the September, 1976 Rambler: "Recently Paul Horton received two thank-you. letters for his efforts as historian of our group. One was from the Division of State History, State of Utah, and the other from the library of the University of Utah. Both expressed appreciation to Paul for adding past Ramblers to their collection. The University of Utah has the best collection with a complete set back to 1950 plus many pre-1950 issues." "Paul also is assembling two sets of Ramblers for binding for the club's private use. He has fairly complete sets back to the mid-1950's, but he needs more back issues to fill in."

The WMC Collection continues to grow as we see written in the July 1975 Rambler. "Old Ramblers, The Board of Directors thanks Chauncey and Emily Hall for their donation of about 10 years of old Ramblers. We still need more, especially from the 1930's, 40's and early 50's. We realize they have great sentimental value, but we should like to Xerox them for our files, or better yet, keep the originals and give you the copies. Paul Horton has had about 9 years bound in 3 volumes and more are soon planned."

More donations are made in 1976, see the February Rambler. "Many thanks to Life Members Frank Trottier and Edith Green who have recently donated WMC historical materials. Frank's donation of Ramblers will be bound with others we have collected and will eventually be placed in a library. Edith donated to the Special Collection section of Western History at the University of Utah. Others who have such material may also wish to donate directly to this collection. Please contact Dr. Everett Cooley at the University of Utah Library."

In the 1979 January Rambler there starts a new writeup called Historical Highlights. "Over the years there have been many articles written in many publications describing the activities of the Wasatch Mountain Club. In "HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS" we hope to reproduce some of the better articles and news clips which describe the activities of the Club since its founding nearly sixty years ago. If there are any members—particularly "old timers"--who have some clippings, or other materials, please won't you share them with your fellow members?" In the 1981 February Rambler the constitution

of the WMC was re-written and presented to Club members for a vote. "ARTICLE IX HISTORY. There shall be a written and pictorial history of the club maintained giving recognition for outstanding services of individuals or groups of individuals to the club. The directors shall appoint a club historian to compile and maintain said history."

In 1983 a major donation was made to the Library in the WMC Manuscript Collection (MS 283). This started with Box 1 Folder 1 thru folder 12 and then Box 2 folders 1 thru 18. It also contained three photo albums for the WMC Photo Collection (P0004). Another significant donation was made on January 2, 1985 of documents collected by WMC Historian Dale Green.

In the 1987 March Rambler Earl Cook writes: "The Rambler functions as the primary history and archival document of the WMC. I believe it is important to record for history the activities and happenings of the club. If it is not done through the Rambler; I fear the club's history will be lost. As it is said, those who are not aware of history are doomed to repeat it."

From the October, 1992 Rambler by Dale Green WMC Historian: "A personal friend and a long-time contributor to the Mountain Club, Janet Christensen, passed away in August. As the Club's secretary in the early 1940's, Janet collected many old Club records which were stored in her basement awaiting a suitable repository. The collection was recently given to me by her sister, Edith Petersen. This is perhaps the greatest assemblage of historical records ever given to Club. Included are the complete Board of Director's meeting minutes from 1927 to 1954, a period of which very few other records have been preserved. After a thorough review, much of the material will be donated to the Wasatch Mountain Club's section in the Western Americana collection at the University of Utah."

Mike Treshow became the WMC historian in the late 1990s into the early 2000s. A large donation of materials was made to the WMC Manuscript Collection (MS 283) in 1999 by Michael Treshow and Bill More and went into Boxes 10-26. It was written in the 2002 January Rambler: Onward and Upward by Michael Treshow and Jean Frances "A true labor of love, Mike and Jean have created a masterpiece of local history that every WMC member will want to add to their nightstand collection. From the early days of the 20s and 30s when hikers still yodeled, to the thrilling account of my climb on Mount Owens (see page 134!) this fantastic book chronicles the organization of the club, the early members and escapades (remember the old WMC bus?), the quirks, and strength of character that established the WMC as we know and love it today. EARLY BIRD SPECIAL, ONLY \$10, hurry before the price goes up to \$15 this Fall!"

In the August Rambler of 2009 by John Veranth WMC President: "Speaking of volunteers, our past president and long-time WMC member Mike Treshow has resigned as club historian. Many thanks to Mike for all his dedicated service to the WMC. Alexis Kelner, a font of institutional memory and avid local history writer has generously agreed to take over this important responsibility." As this is written in 2021, Alexis Kelner is still the WMC Historian. Also, as this is written, Donn Seeley, WMC Trustee, does a review of WMC history every month called "50 years ago in the Rambler"

Sometime around 2019 or so The WMC Centennial Planning Committee was organized by President Julie Kilgore. One of the missions of the committee was to present the first 100 years of WMC history each month in the Rambler. We all owe a great deal of thanks to Julie for all of the history that was recorded in 2020. Some of us were asked to record the history of "Legends and Heroes" from the Club's past. Phyllis Anderson and Brad Yates took the lead in making a list of members who contributed much to the Club. Phyllis writes: "Here is our list of Heroes and Legends to date. We talked about maybe a page with a photo, but decided to just see where it takes us. In my mind, the heroes were/are larger than life folks who contributed much to the club, but had amazing accomplishments beyond as well." A big thank you to all of the people on the Centennial Planning Committee and many others who contributed to the 2020 one-hundred-year celebrations. Still in the works is a new book on the history of the WMC being written by Debora Frank.





Looking for more help in preserving WMC history.

It was not until the 1960s that a repository for the WMC Archives was set-up in University of Utah Library. The Wasatch Mountain Club Archive was initially all in one repository known as the Western Americana Collection. The current library building was opened in 1968 and named the J. Willard Marriott Library in 1969. The WMC Archives are now kept in the Special Collections section located on the fourth floor of the library. As time has passed and Our Collection has grown, it has been divided into several different sections or departments.

These departments include Multimedia-Photographs, Manuscripts, Print and Journal, and Moving image and sound.

The WMC is looking for many more people to join the WMC History Committee. We would like to archive more photos, and history reports with regards to WMC Biking, Boating, Kayaking, Climbing, Canyoneering, Conservation, Trial Building and Maintenance, Social Activities, Skiing, and Snowshoeing. We would also like to have a coordinator to work with the WMC Special Collections at the University Library.

It would be ideal to have an expert in each activity or perhaps someone who knows about several activities. However, no experience is necessary! We want people who are interested in preserving our past history and recording the present activities for future generations. There is no timetable nor deadline, so no pressure or stress to get things done.

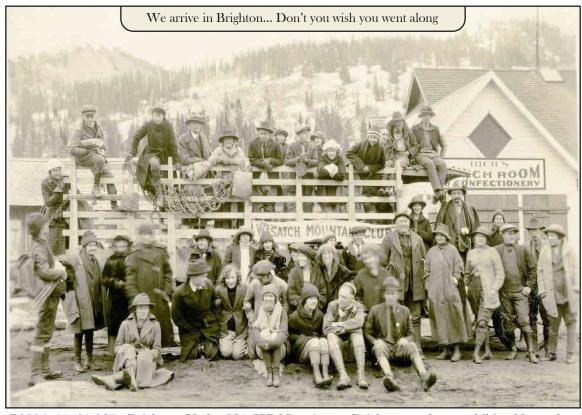

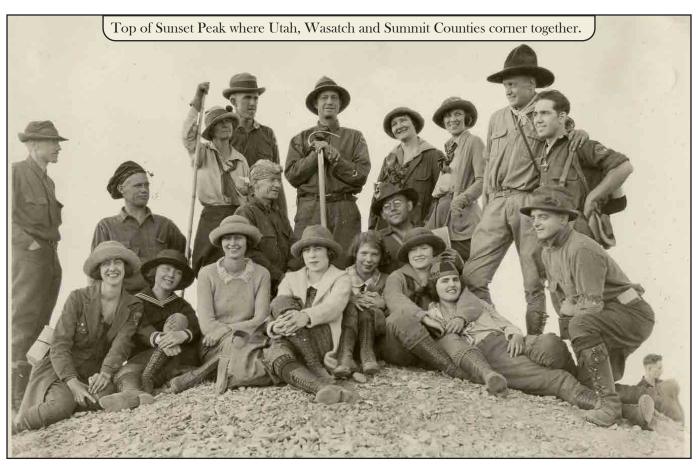

Preservation Preservation Utah Awards & Gala

On October 22, seven of us from the WMC put away our hiking boots and dusted off our formal attire to attend the 2021 Heritage Awards and Gala held by Preservation Utah at the Natural History Museum.

Preservation Utah is a nonprofit organization founded in 1966 as Utah Heritage Foundation. Their mission is "to keep the past alive, not only for preservation but to inspire and provoke a more creative present and sustainable future. (They) preserve, promote, and protect Utah's historic built environment through public awareness, advocacy, and active preservation."

Wasatch Mountain Club and the Wasatch Mountain Club Foundation, which oversees the lodge, were among the 14 awardees honored that evening. The Lodge foundation was recognized in the Stewardship category for its efforts to preserve the lodge into its second century and beyond. The foundation recently initiated a multi million-dollar fundraising campaign to ensure the lodge's survival by strengthening its foundation and making other necessary upgrades and repairs. One important goal is to increase access to the lodge across the community.

Our club was recognized in the Heritage category as "Utah's oldest and largest continually running outdoor recreation group." The club has not only thrived for a century—our efforts to preserve its history are significant, as demonstrated by the special Ramblers published since January 2020.

The evening began with wine (what, no chardonnay?) and socializing, followed by a buffet dinner and the awards ceremony. Julie Kilgore, along with Phyllis Anderson and Mark Jones, received the club's award, while Renae Olsen and JoDene Arakelian received the lodge's award. The presentation included a slideshow that featured each awardee.

When David Amott, Ph.D., the Executive Director of Preservation Utah, introduced himself, I thought, oh, interesting, the same name as an early club member. So, when he said that Eugene Amott was his grandfather, I was delighted. Eugene wrote terrific descriptions of 1920s activities, but he only showed up in Ramblers for a few years. David explained that his father died young of "the family



disease." I didn't recognize the name of the disease, but David said it's easily curable now. A C. R. or Ralph Amott also appears in 1920s Ramblers, and David explained that he was Eugene's brother. He, too, wrote memorable articles.

Mark Jones found this fun tidbit in the May 1926 Rambler:

CLUB TATTLE

It was rumored that Ralph Amott received some encouragement to help him over the hill on the

Brighton trip, but he insists there was no breach of prohibition. Officer Joe Richards was along with him,

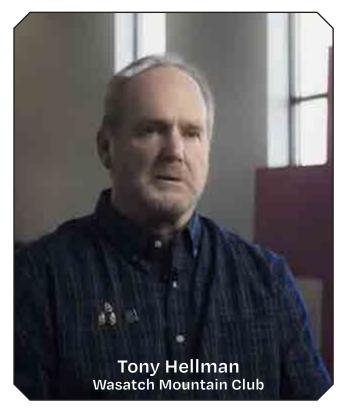
Good Neighbor of the Year Award

Trail Etiquette & Erosion

Doing The Right Thing!

When you are hiking, snowshoeing, mountain biking, or horseback riding on a mountain trail or in your neighborhood please observe and teach others about correct trail etiquette.

Remember the FIRST RULE of trail etiquette is that the "uphill traveler always has the right of way". Uphill requires more energy and their vision is less than downhill travelers.

Otherwise, horses ultimately have the right of way. Hikers and bikers should give them plenty of room & move to the downhill side of trail. Speak softly and no quick movements so you don't spook the animal. It also helps if you're not hiding behind a bush so they can see you are clearly a person.

When coming up behind others, slow down and simply say hello to let them know you're there and ask if you may pass on the left or right. But for erosion's (and plant's) sake, please stay on the trail. And if hiking in a group - stay in single file and share the trail.

Bikers AND hikers remember that your bikes & boots can cause erosion on wet-muddy trails, so when it's wet, please turn back!

When hiking with your four legged friends (dogs) on an appropriate trail, be sure to keep your animal under control and let others know if it's friendly or not. Also remember when they leave a "deposit" that it's YOUR responsibility to pick it up and take it with you - if you must leave the bag behind, please be sure to pick it up when you return.

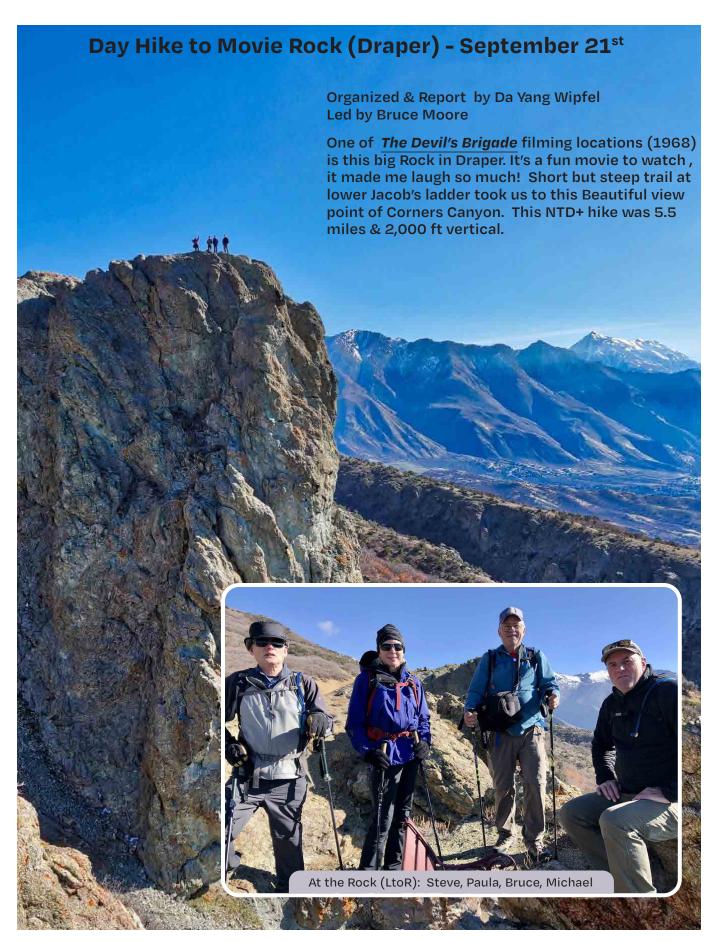
Black Crook Peak (9,274 ft) is the highest peak in the Sheeprock Mountains and is located in the southwest of Vernon. It is in the remote area, which requires driving on a rough dirt road. There are three routes to the peak. All of the routes are entirely cross-country (no trail). We picked the southeast ridge route. The first part of the route was on the steep class 2 slope. Once we were up to the ridge, the route was mostly class 3 with a couple of false peaks. There are many bumps on the ridge. We thought the further peak was our destination. But the peak was the closest one with red rocks. The summit had a geological survey marker, an old metal construction, and a registration plastic bottle. The views from the summit were fantastic. We took a very long break at the summit. Due to scrambling, it was a slow hike for the short distance (4 miles RT). But the slow pace was fine for the very scenic hike. The hike took five hours in total including breaks.

Strongs Peak (8,256 ft) is located in the southwest of Mt. Ogden and is rarely climbed. We started from the Beus Canyon Trailhead in South Ogden. 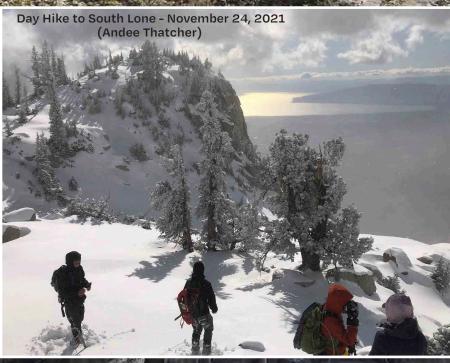

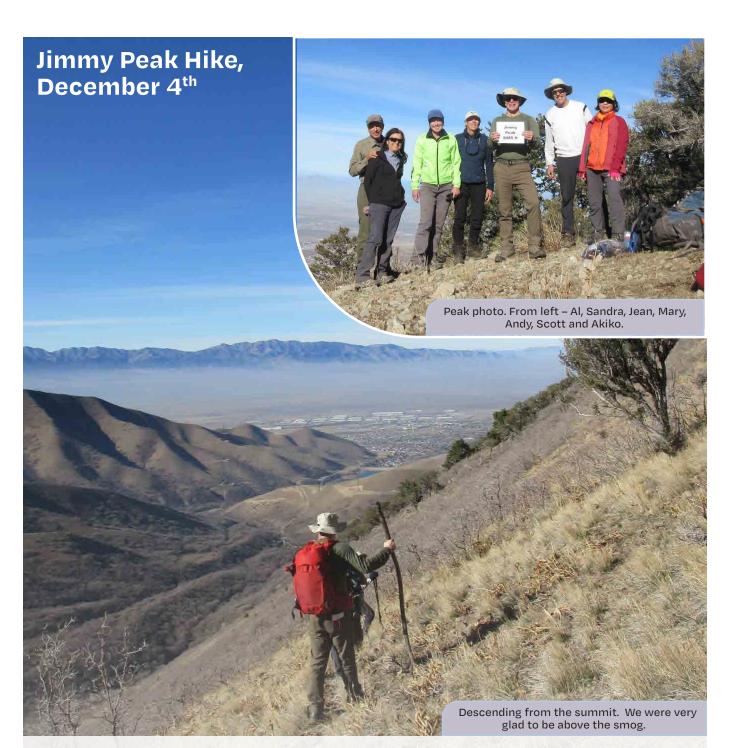

Jimmy Peak (8,485 ft) is located between Settlement Canyon and Middle Canyon in Tooele (the Oquirrh Mountain Range) and is rarely climbed. It was the first club hike for Scott. There was a summit cairn (or a fire pit). The summit offered great views of Tooele Valley, Stansbury Island, Great Salt Lake, Stansbury Mountains, and other Oquirrh mountains. From the summit, we went down to Ridge Trail to go back to the TH. Ridge Trail was very scenic. The creek along with the trail was frozen. This hike took 6 hours in total including breaks (distance – 7.8 miles, elevation gain – 3,686 ft).

pools. Our hike back to the trailhead was equally enjoyable as we



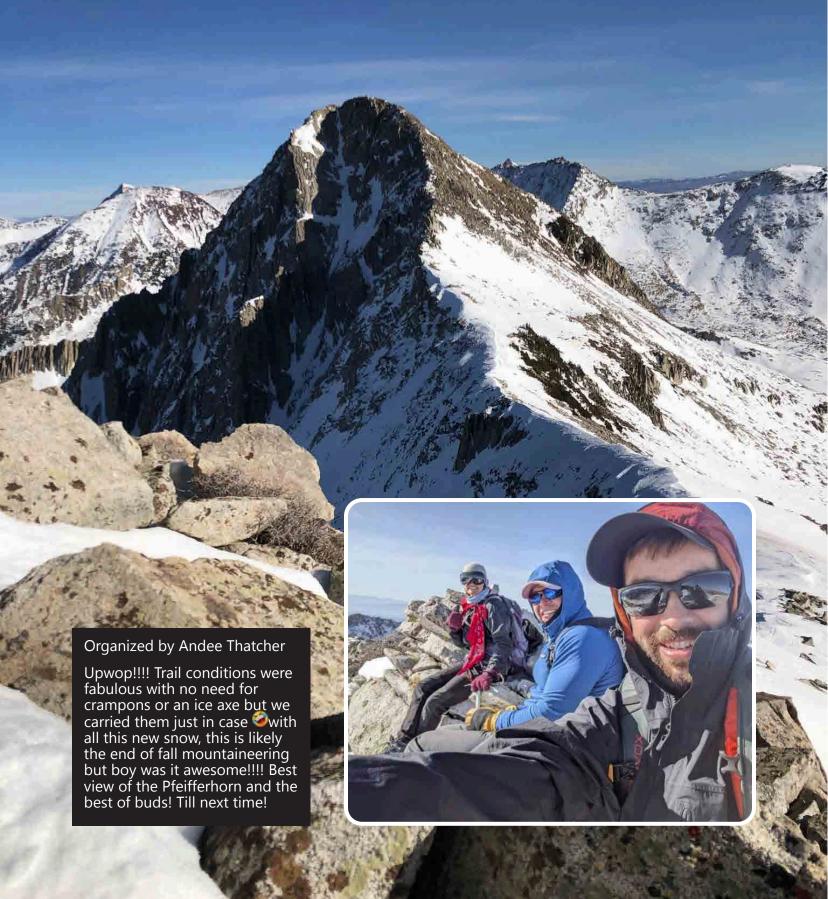

Boulter Peak (8,308 ft) is the highest peak in the East Tintic Mountains and is one of the Utah prominent peaks. We started near the mouth of Black Rock Canyon and hiked to Mill Canyon. The first part of the trail was shaded. But once the views became more open, we could see beautiful views. There is Dry Lake in the north of Boulter Peak. The lake was really dry. We walked on the lake.

There is a trail all the way to the summit. But we took off-trail for the last part to save distance. The summit has a geological survey marker. Interestingly, the marker does not have the name of the peak and the elevation. We wrote our names on the registration notebook and took a long lunch break to enjoy the stunning views. We did not see any other hikers or anyone. We had the entire area by ourselves – wonderful solitude. This hike took 5 hours and 30 minutes in total including breaks (distance – 9.87 miles, elevation gain – 2,976 ft).



Craner Peak Hike - December 5th

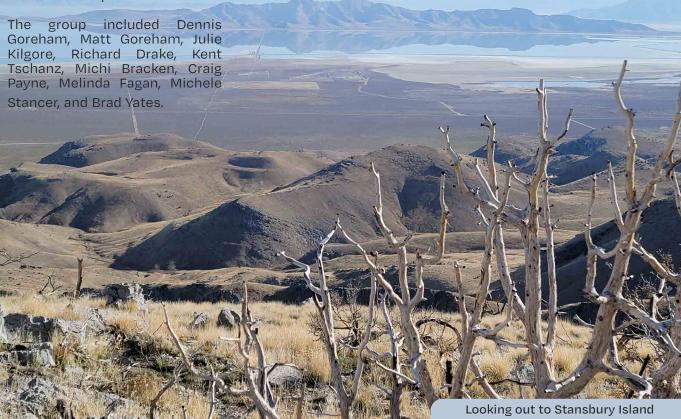
On December 5th, we had a wonderful hike in the Lakeside Mountains on the southwest side of the Great Salt Lake. Near perfect clear and warm weather, nice route, and a fun group of 10.

We drove the dirt road into the Lakesides and parked near the mouth of Vindicator Canyon. From there we headed up the east ridge of what we call the Lakeside Twins. A pair of peaks with elevations labeled on the USGS map at 6605 and 6607. We headed north and down a few hundred feet across a series of saddles and shorter peaks, following the ridgeline to the top of Craner Peak. Craner is the high point of the Lakesides at 6625 and listed as number 82 on the Utah prominent peaks list.

Fantastic views for the entire hike but particularly spectacular from the top of Craner. A short hike down the east ridge of Craner took us right back to the cars. Total elevation gain on the hike was about 2,500 feet and we hiked about 6 miles.

For some of the participants, this trip was a well-deserved do-over. That last time Michele was in this area, she ripped apart some very important components from the bottom of her SUV. The last time Julie was in this area, she tore up an ankle stepping into a gopher hole on a steep descent. It was good to hike these mountains with no mishaps!

Dragon's Tail has become my favorite route to Grandeur. I discovered it when I was doing some work for Salt Lake County a few years ago when the White family was donating some land at the base of Grandeur, which is an and important section along the Bonneville shoreline. Along the BST, there is some evidence of some past surface extraction activity, and the property to the east soaring above the BST was still owned by a mining company, so I reached out to Charles Keller to see what he might know. For those of you who may not know Charles, he authored the book Lady in the Ore Bucket and he authored the 90+ Faint Trails articles for the WMC Rambler (available under the Member tab of the WMC website). Charles and his lovely wife Alene offered to meet me on the White property and hike up to the White property boundary, and beyond, to what I now know is the Dragon's Tail. How can I not be intrigued by something called the Dragon's Tail?

It turns out I've been looking at this prominent band of limestone cliffs snaking it's way up towards Grandeur every time I drive east on I-80 towards to Parleys Canyon! As with most hikes along the Wasatch foothills, this route is incredibly steep. But it is a dynamic route that regularly changes scenery, has a wee little bit of a scramble, and avoids all the crowds that are heading up the middle of the traditional route. And the November morning that the WMC headed up, there were some intriguing cloud formations wrapping around us.

Applicant Agreement, Acknowledgement of Risk and Release from Liability

VOLUNTARY PARTICIPATION: I acknowledge that my participation in all WMC activities is voluntary. No one is forcing me to participate. I agree to abide by the rules of the WMC.

ASSUMPTION OF RISK: I am aware that WMC activities involve risks, and may result in injury, illness, death, and damage to or loss of property. These dangers include but are not limited to: the hazards of traveling in remote areas without medical services or care, the forces of nature, the inherent dangers involved in participation in sports, wilderness travel, and social activities, and the negligent actions of other persons or agencies. I understand that all activities should be considered exploratory, with the possibility of unexpected conditions and route variations. The WMC is not, nor does it provide, a professional guide service. In order to partake in the enjoyment and excitement of WMC activities, I am willing to accept the risk and uncertainty involved as being an integral part of the activity. 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This Great Sundial: In July 1924, the Wasatch Mountain Club named Sundial, which later became the club's emblem. Here's an article from the Salt Lake Tribune on July 13 of that year. There are so many fun details from such a different time, that I'm copying the whole article:

The public has been invited to join in the third annual community trip of the WMC to lakes Blanche, Florence, and Minnie. The feature of the excursion will be the official christening of the well-known peak at the head of these lakes, heretofore known as "Castle Rock" which will be renamed "This Great Sundial." This name was suggested by Alfred Lambourne, Utah's artist and poet, who will be the guest of honor of the club on this occasion, his health permitting. Mr. Lambourne in his early days spent a great deal of time painting and writing about the Wasatch mountains, and it was he who named the now famous Lake Blanche. Federal surveyors will give the peak this name on the official map they are to make of that region soon.

Appropriate exercises will be held. Dr. John E. Broaddus acting as master of ceremonies. Club members who are automobile owners and the public owning cars are asked by the committee in charge to make the trip in them. Others who do not own cars will be furnished autos by the club at reasonable rates.

The cars will leave the Salt Lake Theater at 4 o'clock this morning so that the mountain climbing may be done before the heat of the day. The vehicles will be under the charge of Dr. J. E. Broaddus, Pauline Clinger, Iva Tanner and Clarence R. Parry.
